Protocol for A Chapter Member

- 1. Maintains all sorority documents in a safe and secure location in the home.
 - Maintains proper decorum in business meetings
 - A. Dresses appropriately in business attire
 - B. Arrives before the official start time
 - C. Silence all electronic communication devices
 - D. Speaks only when recognized by the presiding officer.
 - E. Projects voice or moves to a microphone when speaking so everyone can hear.
 - F. Addresses the presiding officer before speaking (Ex. Madame Basileus, I move that...)
 - G. Respects the Alpha Kappa Alpha Protocol and Order of Rank.
 - H. Keeps remarks brief and concise.
 - I. Accepts the decision of the majority.
 - J. Avoids bringing children to business meetings (unless allowed by chapter).
 - K. Avoids walking during meditation periods,
- 3. Maintains proper decorum at chapter sponsored events.
 - A. Arrives early to greet guest(s) as they arrive.
 - B. Assists before, during and after events.



Soror Kowanna Johnson, selected CDO Soror of the Year for 2018 and the newly elected Anti-Basileus, has proven her commitment and dedication over the years as an extremely active member of Chi Delta Omega Chapter and Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated. She was initiated by Chi Delta Omega Chapter in 2011 and has worked on numerous committees, namely chairing several white party events, held the position of Ivy Leaf Reporter/Public Relations Chair and served as Financial Secretary for the chapter's Ivy Community Foundation. Soror Kowanna has attended all South Atlantic Regional and Boule' Conferences since her initiation with her focus on preparing for leadership and greater service. Her selection and election exemplify the confidence that chapter members have in her ability to meet any challenges set before her as she provides direction for the various national and local program activities.

Soror Kowanna was born in Macon, Georgia, and relocated to Atlantic Beach, Florida at the age of ten. She attended the schools in that community going forward to become a first-generation college student earning a degree in Criminal Justice with a minor in Psychology from the University of North Florida in Jacksonville. While attending the University of North Florida, Soror Kowanna served as the Vice-President of the collegiate chapter of The National Council of Negro Women, where she increased chapter membership, and spearheaded community service projects. Soror Kowanna's community service is extensive but she is most proud of working with local Jacksonville organizations over the past two years campaigning for the Voter's Rights Restoration for felons. Prior to the passing of Florida's Voting Restoration Amendment 4 during the 2018 Florida elections, Soror Kowanna demonstrated her knowledge of felony disenfranchisement laws by travelling throughout Jacksonville educating convicted felons on the process of submitting clemency appeals. Florida was one of four states whose constitution permanently restricted those with past felony convictions.

Professionally, Kowanna is employed at NGA Human Resources where she works in the Legal & Regulatory Division as a Global Audit & Compliance Manager. She is responsible for ensuring that her company passes annual audits performed by external audit firms. This is a critical role in the company because the results of the audits are provided to the company's 200+ client base, which often determine client contract extensions. Prior to this position, she worked 20 years at AT&T and Convergys Corporation where her positions included: Operations Manager, Project Manager, HR Consultant and Regional Compliance Manager. During that time she earned many awards (Future Leaders, Commitment to Excellence, Best Manager, Employee of the Year), for her excellent work ethic and highly focused strategies for successful achievement.

Soror Kowanna is a divorced, proud mother of five children (Khatianna, Christopher, Mekalah, Adrienne and Michael) and the grandmother of 4 (Jahzyra, Kaiden and twins- Isis and Nevaeh).

During her leisure time, Soror Kowanna enjoys making memories with her grandchildren and taking trips with her "Girlfriend's Getaway" travel group.

- 4. Participates in chapter activities and events and attends all ceremonies.
- 5. Maintains chapter business within the chapter.
- 6. Accepts committee appointments.
- 7. Completes assignments in a timely manner.
- 8. Commits to corporate with chapter leadership in implementing all areas of programs and operations.
- 9. Volunteers to work on chapter projects.
- 10. Pays all dues and assessments promptly.
- 11. Participates in leadership training sessions at the chapter, regional and/or international levels.
- 12. Offers commendation to sorors for a job well-done.
- 13. Offers constructive criticism with the intent on being a part of the solution, avoids undue criticism.
- 14. Welcomes visitors and new sorors to the chapter to help them experience a friendly, warm and welcoming atmosphere.
- 15. Informs the community of outstanding programs and activities, when appropriate.
- 16. Reaches out to those who do not utilize electronic communications to ensure they are properly informed.
- 17. Offers special consideration to Former Directorate Members, Former Executive Directors elderly or physicallychallenged sorors (seating, transportation assistance, securing handouts, meeting notifications, etc.)
